2. Mayor Mezzo led in the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag.
3. **VOTED:** Unanimously on a motion by Deputy Mayor Rossi and seconded by Burgess Scully that the Board of Mayor and Burgesses approve the minutes of the regular meeting of **August 5, 2014** and the special meeting of **August 12, 2014**. Each member received copies for review.
4. **VOTED:** Unanimously on a motion by Deputy Mayor Rossi and seconded by Burgess Scully that the Board of Mayor and Burgesses approve the monthly reports of **August**. Each member received copies for review.
5. **VOTED:** Unanimously on a motion by Deputy Mayor Rossi and seconded by Burgess Burns to recess to Executive Session at **6:32 p.m.** for discussion on the following: **Contract Negotiations** (EMS), **Real Estate Negotiations** (Parcels A, B and C, Risdon Property and Industrial Park) inviting in Attorney E. Fitzpatrick, Naugatuck Economic Development Corporation CEO R. Pugliese and Fire Chief K. Hanks.

Mayor Mezzo reconvened the meeting at **7:05 p.m.**

6. There were no motions emanating from Executive Session.
7. **VOTED:** Unanimously on a motion by Deputy Mayor Rossi and seconded by Burgess Scully that the Board of Mayor and Burgesses recess to the **Firemen's Pension Plan "C" Board** at **7:06 p.m.**

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Mayor Mezzo reconvened the meeting at **7:10 p.m.**

8. Public Comment

Do not use herbicides for roadside spraying in front of residences. Use part time seasonal help to cut back the brush. The potential power plant in Oxford is not a good idea. Is there a cost associated with the ordinance change to the Council of Governments?

9. Burgess Comments – Open Topic

**Burgess Vitale** said the citing council hasn't reviewed the Oxford Plant proposal but work was already moving forward. There is a broken window at the old Prospect Street School. He mentioned putting the borough board meetings on a podcast/webcast.

**Mayor Mezzo** said the grant application was filed for the electric charging station. More information will follow.

**Deputy Mayor Rossi** congratulated the Portuguese Club and the Mayor for the Day, Al Janiero. He's done an incredible job for the club and the community. She heard wonderful things about the Arts Festival and thanked the Arts Commission for all they do. She wished the students good luck on their new school year. There was a horrific accident this week when a person was struck and killed by a train. The Deputy Mayor said we are very fortunate to have the public safety employees that we do. She thanked them for a job well done in the middle of an awful tragedy.

**Burgess Neth** said the paving on Wooster and Locust Streets was a total disaster. It was only half done. He said people get excited over the little things. Weed whack around a pole after mowing. Clean the garbage downtown. Pave the entire road after utility work is completed. The high school is a fantastic facility. He would like to know if we are going to be able to maintain the facility and complex or do we need to hire someone from the outside?

**Burgess Ernsky** thanked Mayor Mezzo, Burgess Olbrys and everyone who attended the Arts Festival.

**Burgess Olbrys** thanked Arts Commission Chair Lisa D'Andrea for all she does with the Arts Commission. The movie night on the green was wonderful. He was impressed the new superintendent came to movie night. The lines on Candee Road have not been painted and people are driving in the middle of the road. Burgess Olbrys thinks we should hold department head meetings once a month for the public to come and ask questions.

10. **VOTED:** Unanimously on a motion by Deputy Mayor Rossi and seconded by Burgess Neth that the Board of Mayor and Burgesses approve the appointment of **Edith C. Sletner**, 192 Quinn Street, Naugatuck, CT 06770 as a member of the **Naugatuck Valley Health District**, filling the unexpired term of M. Sheehy, term to expire June 1, 2016.

11. **VOTED:** Unanimously on a motion by Deputy Mayor Rossi and seconded by Burgess Scully that the Board of Mayor and Burgesses approve the appointment of **David P. Sletner** (D), 192 Quinn Street, Naugatuck, CT 06770 as an alternate member of the **Planning Commission**, filling the expired term of J. Uszakiewicz, term to expire September 1, 2017.

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12. Motion by Deputy Mayor Rossi and seconded by Burgess Scully that the Board of Mayor and Burgesses hereby **repeal Ordinance #49 Chapter 15 – Planning, Article VII – Regional Council of Elected Officials, Sections 15-134 – 15-136** of the Code of Ordinances of the Borough of Naugatuck, Connecticut and **adopt Ordinance #127 to read as follows**, as if read:

**Ordinance #127**

**Chapter 15 – Planning, Article VII – Ordinance Regarding Adoption of Connecticut General Statute §§4-124i – 4-124p Pertaining to Creating and Joining the Naugatuck Valley Council of Governments, Sections 15-134 – 15-140.**

**WHEREAS**, the Borough of Naugatuck has heretofore been a designated municipality within the Central Naugatuck Valley Planning Region; and,

**WHEREAS**, as an eligible member the borough adopted Ordinance #49, entitled, “Regional Council of Elected Officials”, voted and adopted on July 8, 1970 by the Board of Mayor and Burgesses, joining the Council of Governments for the Central Naugatuck Valley (“COGCNV”) as a regional council of elected officials and remains a member at the present time; and,

**WHEREAS**, the State of Connecticut has determined that a reorganization and redesignation of planning districts shall be completed on or before January 1, 2015; and,

**WHEREAS**, said reorganization recommended the consolidation of the Central Naugatuck Valley Planning Region (comprised of the following municipalities: Beacon Falls, Bethlehem, Cheshire, Middlebury, Naugatuck, Oxford, Prospect, Southbury, Thomaston, Waterbury, Watertown, Wolcott and Woodbury) and Valley Planning Region (comprised of the following municipalities: Ansonia, Derby, Seymour and Shelton) into a Naugatuck Valley Planning District; and,

**WHEREAS**, said Naugatuck Valley Planning District additionally includes the City of Bristol and Town of Plymouth; and,

**WHEREAS**, on or about October 11, 2013 COGCNV and on December 17, 2013 the Valley Council of Governments both approved the voluntary consolidation of the two regions; and,

**WHEREAS**, on or about December 24, 2013 the Office of Policy and Management approved the requested and redesignated the Central Naugatuck Valley and Valley Planning Regions into the Naugatuck Valley Planning Region; and,

**WHEREAS**, the Naugatuck Valley Council of Governments (“NVCOG”) operating within the newly established Planning Region will commence operations on January 1, 2015; and,

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**WHEREAS**, the Borough of Naugatuck would like to participate in the creation of NVCOG as the council of governments for the Naugatuck Valley Planning Region by (1) approving an ordinance pursuant to C.G.S. §4-124j adopting C.G.S. §§4-124i-4-124p; (2) filing a certified copy of the adopting ordinance with the Office of Policy and Management of the State of Connecticut (“OPM”); and, (3) upon certification by the Secretary of OPM participating in the operation of the transitional executive committee of NVCOG, which transitional period shall conclude on December 31, 2014 at 11:59:59 PM; and,

**WHEREAS**, the Borough of Naugatuck (1) shall remain a member of COGCNV as it continues to operate and wind down as a council of elected officials until December 31, 2014 and participates in the negotiation of the terms and conditions pertinent to the operation of NVCOG prior to January 1, 2015; and, (2) recognizes the necessity of the current members of COGCNV to remain in operation as an unincorporated association of municipalities in order to wind down the affairs and assets of COGCNV that are either not assigned to and integrated within the operations of NVCOG and which the municipalities believe need to remain separate and distinct from NVCOG: and,

**WHEREAS**, the Borough of Naugatuck recognizes that its historic region is the Naugatuck River Valley consisting of the towns of Naugatuck, Beacon Falls, Oxford, Seymour, Ansonia, Derby and Shelton.

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, AS FOLLOWS:**

**Sec. 15-134. Creation of Naugatuck Valley Council of Governments.**

The Borough of Naugatuck hereby joins with such municipalities of the Naugatuck Valley Planning Region, as designated by the Secretary of the Office of Policy and Management of the State of Connecticut, to create a regional council of governments to be known as the Naugatuck Valley Council of Governments by adopting the provisions of C.G.S. §§4-124i – 4-124p.

**Sec. 15-135. Transitional Provision. Certification by the Secretary of the Office of Policy and Management. Transitional Executive Committee and Transitional Period.**

(a) Upon certification by the secretary of said Office of Policy and Management that at least sixty percent of the municipalities in the planning region have adopted ordinances creating a regional council of government, as required by the Connecticut General Statutes, the Naugatuck Valley Council of Governments shall be established.

(b) Upon such certification, the transitional period shall commence. Said transitional period shall conclude on December 31, 2014 at 11:59:59 PM. During

such period the borough shall participate in the Transitional Executive Committee for the purposes set forth in the Connecticut General Statutes. The mayor shall be a member of the Transitional Executive Committee. In the absence of the mayor, the legislative body of the borough shall appoint an elected official to serve as a member. The mayor may send a representative in his or her stead; however, such representative shall not be a member of said executive committee.

(c) This section shall expire at the conclusion of the transitional period and thereafter be void and of no force and effect.

**Sec. 15-136. Membership in the Naugatuck Valley Council of Governments.**

On and after January 1, 2015, the borough shall be a member of the Naugatuck Valley Council of Governments.

**Sec. 15-137. Powers and Duties of the Naugatuck Valley Council of Governments.**

The Naugatuck Valley Council of Governments shall have such powers, purposes, rights, duties and responsibilities as shall be set forth in the Connecticut General Statutes.

**Sec. 15-138. Representative to the Naugatuck Valley Council of Government.**

The mayor shall be the representative of the borough to the council of governments. In the absence of the mayor, the legislative body of the borough shall appoint an elected official to serve as a member. The mayor may send an alternate in his or her stead; however, such alternate shall be entitled to such rights as may be established by the council of governments. The borough shall be entitled to one vote in the affairs of the council of governments.

**Sec. 15-139. The Council of Governments of the Central Naugatuck Valley, Successor Association.**

The borough shall remain a member of Council of Governments for the Central Naugatuck Valley as it continues to operate and wind down as a council of elected officials until December 31, 2014. The borough shall also participate with the current members of council of elected officials in an unincorporated association of such municipalities in order to wind down the affairs and assets of the Council of Governments of the Central Naugatuck Valley that are either not assigned to and integrated within the operations of Naugatuck Valley Council of Governments.

**Sec. 15-140. Repeal of Prior Ordinances.**

On or after January 1, 2015 the following ordinance provisions regarding the council of elected officials shall be repealed:

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- a. Ordinance #49 entitled, “Regional Council of Elected Officials”, Chapter 15, Article VII, Sections 15-134, 15-135, and 15-136, effective 1973, voted and adopted on July 8, 1970.

- 13. Motion by Deputy Mayor Rossi and seconded by Burgess Neth that the Board of Mayor and Burgesses adopt the following resolution regarding an **Appropriation and Bond Authorization of \$12,430,000 for the Incinerator Repair and Facilities Planning Project**, as if read:

RESOLVED, the Board of Mayor and Burgesses hereby adopts and recommends to the Board of Finance and the Board of Mayor and Burgesses sitting jointly and the electors of the Borough of Naugatuck (the “Borough”) that:

(i) the sum of \$12,430,000 be appropriated for the cost of the Incinerator Repair and Facilities Planning Project including, but not limited to, (i) the planning, design and construction of improvements needed to comply with new federal standards as well as general maintenance and repairs to the Incinerator and (ii) the development of a facilities plan for the Incinerator, the Wastewater Treatment Plant, the Sanitary Sewer Collection System and the Sanitary Sewer System Pump Station and (iii) all engineering, consultant and other services and temporary and permanent financing costs, the Board of Finance hereby recommends that to meet said appropriation and in lieu of a tax therefore, that the Borough issue bonds or notes in an amount not to exceed \$12,430,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary after deducting grants or other sources of funds available therefore to finance such appropriation.

(ii) the Mayor and the Treasurer of the Borough be authorized to issue and sell temporary notes of the Borough not to exceed \$12,430,000 in anticipation of the receipt of the proceeds from the sale of such bonds and to determine the amount, date, date of maturity, interest rate, form and other details of such notes or bonds, pursuant to the Charter of the Borough and Chapter 109 of the Connecticut General Statutes, as amended, or any other provision of law thereto enabling, provided that the proceeds from the sale of such notes shall be used for said purpose; and

(iii) the Mayor and the Treasurer of the Borough shall sign the bonds or notes by either manual or facsimile signatures and that the law firm of Pullman & Comley, LLC is designated as bond counsel to approve the legality of the bonds or notes; and

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(iv) the Mayor is authorized to designate a bank or trust company to be the certifying bank, registrar, transfer agent and paying agent of the bonds or notes; to sell the bonds or notes at public or private sale; to deliver the bonds or notes; and to perform all other acts which are necessary or appropriate to issue the bonds or notes including entering into a continuing disclosure agreement pursuant to the Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15(c)(2)(12). The Mayor and the Treasurer of the Borough are further authorized to bind the Borough pursuant to such representations and covenants as they deem necessary or advisable in order to maintain the continued exemption from federal income taxation of interest on the bonds or notes, including covenants to pay rebates of investment earnings to the United States in future years.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Mayor is hereby authorized to submit the resolution as set forth above (the “Resolution”) to an election of the electors of the Borough and the Borough Clerk is hereby directed to provide notice to the Connecticut Secretary of State and the electors of the Borough of such election to be held on November 4, 2014, between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. for a yes or no vote under the following heading:

Shall the Borough of Naugatuck appropriate \$12,430,000 for the cost of the Incinerator Repair and Facilities Planning Project, including, but not limited to, (i) the planning, design and construction of improvements needed to comply with new federal standards as well as general maintenance and repairs to the Incinerator, (ii) the development of a facilities plan for the Incinerator, Wastewater and Sanitary Sewer Systems and (iii) and all engineering, consultant and related costs and authorize the issuance of bonds and notes in the amount of \$12,430,000 or so much as may be necessary after receiving grants or other funds available therefor to finance such appropriation?

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Borough reasonably expects to incur expenditures (the “Expenditures”) in connection with the capital project for which a general functional description is provided above. The Borough reasonably expects to reimburse itself for the cost of the Expenditures with the proceeds of general obligation bonds and notes of the Borough described above. The maximum principal amount of such debt (both bonds and notes) is not expected to exceed \$12,430,000. This declaration of official intent is a declaration of official intent made pursuant to Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that should the electors of the Borough approve the Resolution, the Mayor and the Treasurer and other proper officers and employees of the Borough are authorized to take all other action which is necessary or desirable to contract and complete the Project and to issue bonds, notes or other obligations to defray the

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aforesaid appropriation. Should the bonds or notes be issued as obligations on which the interest earned is includable in the gross income of the owners thereof, it is hereby determined that the bonds and notes and the project for which they are issued is in the public interest.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the preparation, printing and distribution of a concise explanatory text and/or the dissemination of other neutral printed material in accordance with Section 9-369b of the Connecticut General Statutes is hereby authorized.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Resolution regarding the Appropriation and Bond Authorization of \$6,000,000 for the Incinerator Repair Project previously approved by this Board of Mayor and Burgesses is hereby rescinded.
